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New Reporting Template

The NSW Department of Education has developed a new report template for Kindergarten to Year 10 and we will be trialling this template this year. The template responds to feedback from parents and carers who wanted clearer, more concise information on their child's progress, while helping schools streamline the reporting process.

What has changed?

• For Years K-6, teacher comments are required for English, mathematics, and a general comment section. The five point achievement scale will be used for students in Year 1 to Year 6.

Achievement description	Word descriptor
Your child's achievement in this subject is outstanding. They confidently apply their knowledge and skills in a range of new and complex situations.	Outstanding
Your child's achievement in this subject is high. They confidently apply their knowledge and skills in a range of familiar and new situations.	High
Your child's achievement in this subject is at the expected standard. They apply their knowledge and skills in familiar situations.	Expected
Your child's achievement in this subject is basic. They apply their knowledge and skills in familiar situations with support.	Basic
Your child's achievement in this subject is limited. They apply their knowledge and skills in some familiar situations with significant support.	Limited

- Kindergarten reports include comments for all other key learning areas within the general comment. Students in Kindergarten will not receive a grade in Semester One. After consultation with staff, we have made a school based decision that students will receive a grade in Semester Two.
- A new plain English achievement scale that uses clear, accessible language to help parents and carers better understand their child's progress will also be used.

4th Restorative reflection with the class teacher (Written or Verbal)


Restorative Practice

Restorative Practice is a positive approach that works with students, rather than doing things to them or for them. Conflict is an inevitable part of life. How we work to resolve conflict impacts on a school's climate and culture and ultimately on students' social and academic outcomes.

Restorative practice within schools encourages behaviour that is supportive and respectful. It puts the onus on individuals to be truly accountable for their behaviour and to repair any harm caused to others as a result of their actions.

A restorative approach focuses on building, maintaining and restoring positive relationships, particularly when incidents that involve interpersonal conflict or wrongdoing occur.















Become a Foster Carer in Petersham

The NSW Department of Communities and Justice (DCJ) is urgently seeking potential foster carers in the Petersham area. We need people who can provide care for children, young people, or siblings, aged 0-18 years-old, for a few days, to a few months and beyond.

Foster carers support families by caring for children who are unable to remain at home. Foster carers come from all walks of life and their families reflect the wider community we live in. Carers can be single, partnered and be with or without children of their own. Aboriginal, Torres Strait Islanders and people from culturally diverse backgrounds are encouraged to apply.

Foster carers receive initial and ongoing training and support from a dedicated foster care caseworker. There are financial support packages available to foster carers to support a child's education, medical needs, food costs and other daily living costs.
